New College Students Set to Study in China

New College of Florida's program in Chinese Language and Culture has seven who have received grants from the Chinese government to study in China next year. Three students will be fully funded for the 2010-2011 academic year, and four will be studying in the spring 2011 term. All have received full scholarships, including tuition, board and stipend. The grants were made through the Chinese government's partnership with the Confucius Institute at the University of South Florida.

This is the first time that the Chinese government has offered a full scholarship through USF's Confucius Institute. The Institute is a collaborative effort with China's Office of Chinese Language Council International ("Hanban") under the Ministry of Education and Nankai University, which is USF's designated partner university. All seven New College students who applied were recommended by Dr. Zhaoying Han, the director of the Confucius Institute, and all were accepted.



Kathleen Brindley (Tampa), Rebecca Christoforo (Andover, MA) and Maya Praff (Ellicott City, MD) will be studying in China for the entire 2010-11 academic year, Kathleen at Zhejiang University in Hangzhou and the others at Nankai University in Tianjin. Both are among the top universities in China. Ariel Hensley (Ridgewood, CT), Jacob Long (Marco Island, FL), Lacey Sigmon (Valrico, FL) and Dara Osher (Pompano Beach, FL) will attend the spring 2011 semester-long program at Nankai University.

All of the students are either studying or concentrating in Chinese Language and Culture at New College. The program is led by faculty members Dr. Jing Zhang and Dr. Aijun Zhu, both of whom led the students through the complex application process. "I am so proud of our students," said Zhang. "We've had a great of interest in our program, not only because it is unique and new, but also because the College doesn't currently have any other areas of concentration that deal with Asia. China has been attracting a lot of attention in recent years, and in that respect it's quite a pragmatic language." She noted that 35 percent of the students have studied or plan to study in China. Zhang said that while Chinese is considered one of the most difficult languages to master because of its unique writing system, it is the artistic, calligraphic aspect of the lettering that students enjoy most. "They have quite a sense of achievement with the characters," she said, "and find it both challenging and satisfying." The Chinese Language and Culture program at New College offers courses at all levels of Chinese language as well as courses and tutorials on Chinese language, literature and culture in English translation. Language courses are offered regularly, and cultural content courses change each year covering both surveys and special topics.

USF Sarasota-Manatee Under Construction in North Port

Charlotte Construction is hard at work on the 6,400 square feet University of South Florida Sarasota-Manatee (USFSM) location in North Port. The interior was designed by Debbie Graves of Fleischman-Garcia Architecture, Sarasota. The USFSM portion of the building in the Pan American Professional Center on U.S 41 will be complete well before classes begin in the fall.

The new location will host more than 500 students plus faculty, offer a variety of courses and programs and will set the foundation for future growth.

"This move is a great example of community, private sector and government working together to create a much needed facility," said Jeff Charlotte. The City of North Port agreed to provide incentive dollars annually for the first five years. North Port officials also waived all city impact fees, building permit fees and will help with additional parking and security. IBERIABANK provided the best possible lease agreement for USFSM and the estimating and planning team for Jeff Charlotte Construction Corp. worked diligently with trade partners to create a proposal within the budget guidelines. Classrooms should be ready when the fall class schedule begins.

The final build out will have four classrooms, seminar space, student workspace and office space. USF Sarasota-Manatee has served the Venice, Englewood, North Port and surrounding areas for the past six years with courses that include undergraduate coursework in business, criminology, interdisciplinary social science, elementary education and psychology.

At the Master's level students may pursue a degree in Educational Leadership. Due to the tremendous growth in enrollment, they are relocating to this new location and will be providing additional courses and programs including the General Business major.

USF Sarasota-Manatee prepares future educators for careers in teaching

More than 50 students who recently graduated from the College of Education heard a motivational presentation by Megan Allen. the 2010 Florida Department of Education and Macy's Teacher of the Year. Allen's presentation was entitled "Teaching with Soul: Words of Wisdom for **Beginning Teachers** Taught through Motown and Soul.'

"I've been working in retail for awhile and am excited about hitting the pavement and looking for a job as a teacher," said

Pamela Melton, who received her Master

of Arts in Teaching.

"Some people are saying it's rough right

now to find a job, but others say that it won't be that bad, that the schools are always looking for great teachers. I'll be excited even to substitute now and get to work with the kids."

Allen reminded the USFSM students that being a teacher was among the noblest of professions, and that not many people get the opportunity to do what they are passionate about. She quoted Howard Thurman by saying, "Don't ask what the world needs. Ask what makes you come alive, and go do it. Because what the world needs is people who have come alive."

A fourth grade teacher at Cleveland Elementary School in Hillsborough County and graduate of USF St. Petersburg's Education program, Allen has been traveling the state as the Christa McAuliffe

Ambassador for Education, representing Florida's more than 180,000 teachers to both the state and nation. She meets with lawmakers, education officials, and will wave to the crowd in New York City at Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade. She is also one of the four finalists for National Teacher of the Year.

Students who want to take the "fast track" can receive their Master of Arts in Teaching in two years. USFSM also offers a bachelor's degree in Elementary Education and three master's degree programs for students who have an undergraduate degree in Education-The Master of Arts in Reading, Master of Arts in Elementary Education, and Master of Education in Educational Leadership. New College Has a Seventh Fulbright Winner for 2010-2011

Having already garnered six Fulbright scholars for 2010-2011, New College of Florida has announced that a seventh student has won the prestigious award, bringing the College's total to 57 Fulbright recipients. The College had a record eight recipients in 2009-2010.



Anna Osborne Hamilton, a Humanities major from Saint Augustine, Florida, will be traveling to Mauritius next year under a full grant to study and analyze the increasing use and availability of information and communication technologies. Under the guidance of Christina Meetoo at the University of Mauritius, her anthropology-related project will focus on Mauritian youth, non-government organizations and agricultural cooperatives. Hamilton hopes to supplement her fieldwork with classes in the communication and French departments at the University of Mauritius.

On returning to the U.S., Hamilton plans to pursue a graduate degree in radio journalism and wants to work for National Public Radio as an in-depth, investigative radio journalist and as a university professor in creative journalism. While at New College, she did podcasting, reporting and editing for WSLR, and was also an intern for the Association for Independents in Radio in Boston. She studied sound art at Massachusetts College of Art and Design and spent a semester at sea in 2008 through the University of Virginia.

This year's awards—all from the 2010 graduating class—reinforce the College's ranking as one of the Top 10 liberal arts colleges in terms of per-capita Fulbright production. Since 2001 New College has produced 44 Fulbright scholars.

As previously announced, the six other Fulbright recipients are: Alice Abernathy of Naples, FL (full grant, Spain); Mary Barnes of Houston, TX (English Language Teaching Assistantship, Indonesia); Corianne Etheredge of Beaverton, OR (English Language Teaching Assistantship, South Korea); Taylor Kennedy of Albuquerque, NM (English Language Teaching Assistantship, South Korea); Lauren White of Grosse Pointe Woods, MI (English Language Teaching Assistantship to Germany); and Hannah Woerner of Sarasota, (English Language Teaching Assistantship to Germany). of scholarship; Becca Cook, vice president of leadership; Nellie Woodson, vice president of service; Laura Shade, vice president of fellowship; Roxanna McLeod, public relations secretary; and Rachel Roach, recording secretary. Other members who attended the conference were Willie Braswell, Hayley Durham, Raul Sabala and Alyx Hesser.

The Nu Zeta chapter has been active in community service projects. Members hosted a flea market to raise \$600 for Haitian relief efforts and participated in a local food drive in March. Members joined 100 volunteers to pack 101,000 bags of food for local families during the Community Food Packing Day to benefit All Faiths Food Bank. MTI Wins Big

For the seventh straight year, Manatee Technical Institute students won more medals than any other school in the nation at the 46th Annual SkillsUSA Championships. Of the 942 medal awarded, Florida students took home 109 of them. MTI students alone won 61.

MTI brought home 25 gold, 23 silver and 13 bronze medals. The SkillsUSA Championships are a showcase for the best career and technical education students in the nation. Students work against the clock and each other, proving their expertise in occupations like air conditioning, entrepreneurship, criminal justice, and web design. According to students who compete, the SkillsUSA Championships are like the Olympics for career and technical education.

One of the five new contests this year was Welding Art Sculpture, and MTI student Wesley Johnson took the bronze.

The SkillsUSA Championships began in 1967 and has grown to over 5,600 students competing in 96 different skill, technical and leadership fields. Nearly 1,500 judges and contest organizers from labor and management make the national contests possible.

MTI launches new Pharmacy Technician Training Program

A near-fatal medication overdose administered to the infant twins of famous actor and writer, Dennis Quaid, resulted in a national focus on medication errors and the need for improved training of pharmacy technicians. This and other recently highly publicized medication errors prompted the Florida Board of Pharmacy to require training and subsequent registration of all pharmacy technicians by January 2011.

In response to this increased public interest in eliminating such errors and increasing technical training, Manatee Technical Institute will launch a new Pharmacy Technician training program at its East Campus beginning in August.

The field is one of only a few that the US Department of Labor and the Occupational Outlook Handbook—a national source that predicts the potential growth of certain occupations—predict will experience a 32 percent growth within the next five years. Florida's growing senior citizen population also makes it an ideal candidate for increased growth in this field.

This one-school-year, 1050-hour program, will prepare students for jobs as pharmacy technicians in hospitals, retail pharmacies, and other providers. Pharmacy technicians in Florida earn a beginning wage of \$12 to \$16 per hour.
